Tree Seedling Descriptions

Species	Growth Rate	Mature Height Width	Description
Norway Spruce <i>Picea abies</i>	Medium to Fast	40-60' H 25-30' W	Medium growing pyramidal tree that becomes very graceful in maturity. Prefers moist, well-drained acidic soils; however, it is perhaps the most adaptable common evergreen tree to harsh conditions, it thrives under seasonal drought once established and takes well to city pollution. One requirement is to not plant in wet soils, where it will die quickly.
White Pine <i>Pinus strobus</i>	Fast	50-80' H 25-35' W	Hardy, fast growing pine native to the eastern U.S. Loosely pyramidal as a young tree, becomes more irregular with age. Prefers well-drained or dry sites. Long living tree with long, soft 2-5" needles.
Black Maple <i>Acer nigrum</i>	Moderate	100' H	Black maple is closely related to sugar maple in habit, range, and quality and use of wood. Black maple grows on a variety of soils, but most commonly on moist soils of river bottoms in mixed hardwood forests. It grows rapidly in early life, then slowly and may live 200 years. The trees can be tapped for sap for making maple syrup. Young trees are often browsed by deer, and buds and seeds are eaten by birds.
Shumard Oak <i>Quercus shumardii</i>	Moderate	100' H	Shumard oak is one of the largest southern red oaks. It is a lowland tree and grows scattered with other hardwoods on moist, well-drained soils associated with large and small streams. It grows moderately fast and produces acorns every 2 to 4 years that are used by wildlife for food. This tree makes a wonderful shade tree.
Chinese Chestnut <i>Castanea mollissima</i>	Slow to Medium	40-60' H 40-60' W	This is a nut-producing tree, yielding nuts for human and wildlife consumption. Full sun is the ideal condition for this tree. The Chinese chestnut grows in acidic, loamy, moist, sandy, well-drained, and clay soils. It is drought tolerant. This tree should be planted in pairs or groups to ensure pollination.
Arrowwood Viburnum <i>Viburnum dentatum</i>	Fast	3-9' H 8' W	Arrowwood is a native shrub. The common name refers to the Native American use of the straight young stems as arrow shafts. The plant's arching branches form an overall rounded crown; twigs are slender, ridged and angled. Leaves are shiny dark green above and paler beneath. Foliage turns yellow to red or reddish purple in late fall. Small white flowers are presented in 2 to 4-inch flat-topped clusters in May to early June. The ¼ inch berry-like drupes are bluish-black and attractive to wildlife. Fruiting occurs from August - November. It prefers loamy, neutral to acid soil with ample moisture, but is adaptable to a range of conditions from dry to fairly wet soil.
White Flowering Dogwood <i>Cornus florida</i>	Medium	20-40' H 20-40' W	Tree has white flowers in the spring and red berries in the fall. Prefers moist, well drained soils in full sun to partial shade. Attracts songbirds, used for ornamental and wildlife plantings.
Bald Cypress <i>Taxodium distichum</i>	Moderate	50-70' H 25' W	The Bald Cypress tree is the classic tree of southern swamps. There, in its native habitat, it displays a peculiar habit of raising conical "knees" from its roots-some believe it is a way to help the roots get oxygen. Majestic orange-red fall color, great urban tree, adaptable to wet or dry conditions, pale green, semi-evergreen leaves. Bald Cypress form characteristic groves in swampy areas that support complex and variable ecosystems and are used by many wildlife species. The fruit is oval, 1 inch long, attractive to wildlife. Preferred roost tree for wild turkeys, seeds eaten by wood ducks. Hollows provide habitat, nests, dens, etc. for fish, woodpeckers, ducks, racoon, and other woodland mammals.
